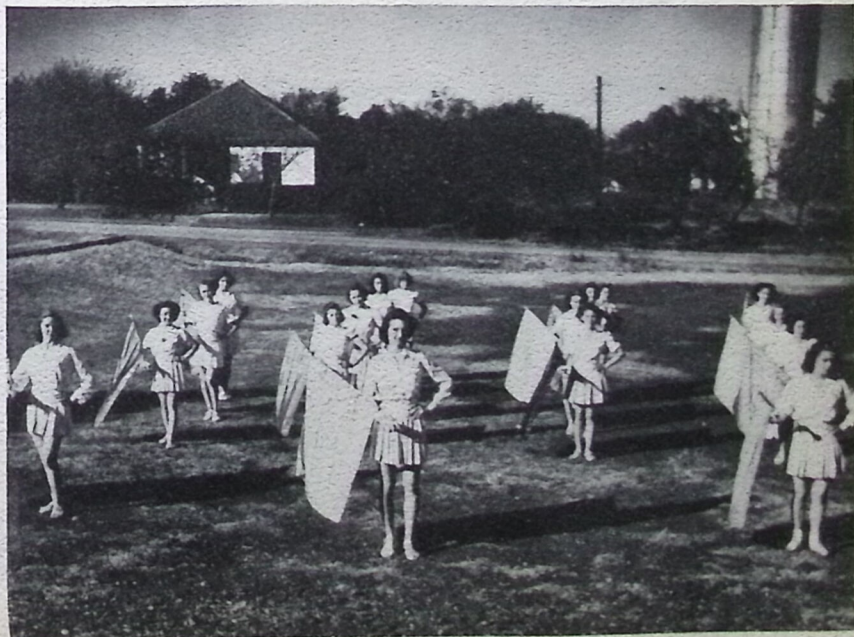

The flag twirlers are pictured to the right. With Leonard Mae Turbiville as the leader they lend a graceful air to the band's strict formations with their green and gold flags.



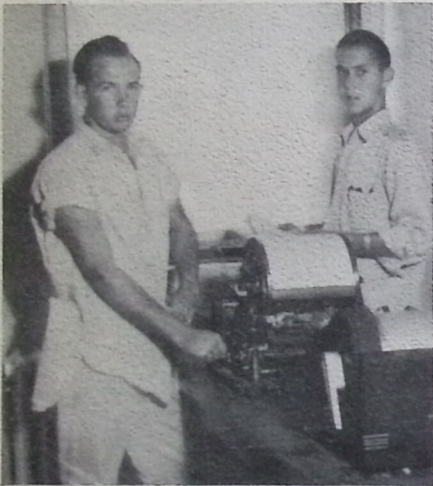

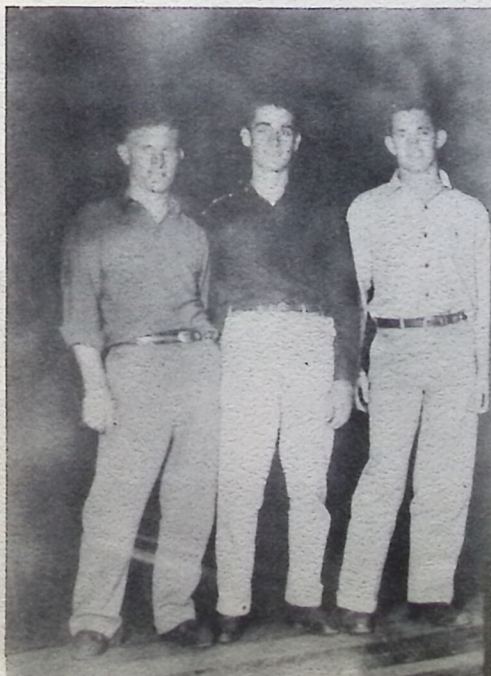


CHORAL CLUB

Kizzie Ellen Sagebiel, right, is soprano soloist of the Choral Club. She has done several special numbers at high school entertainments.



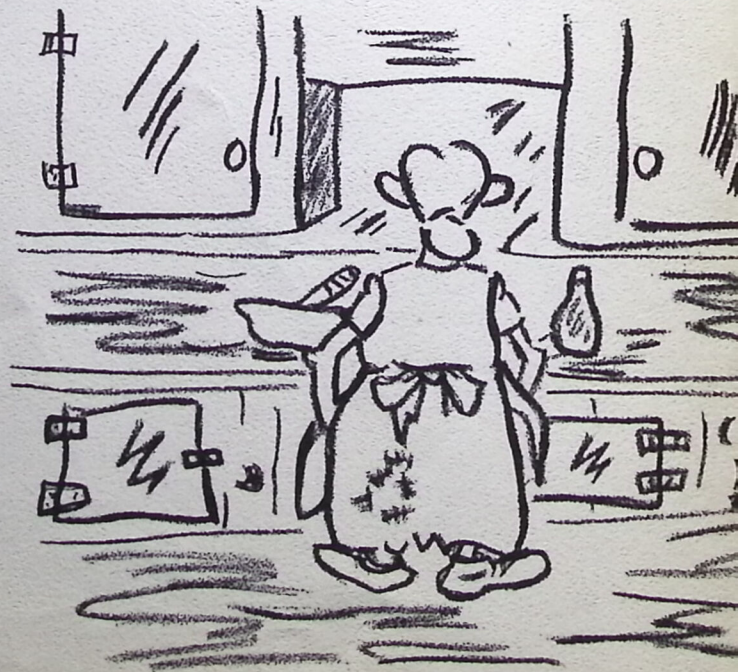
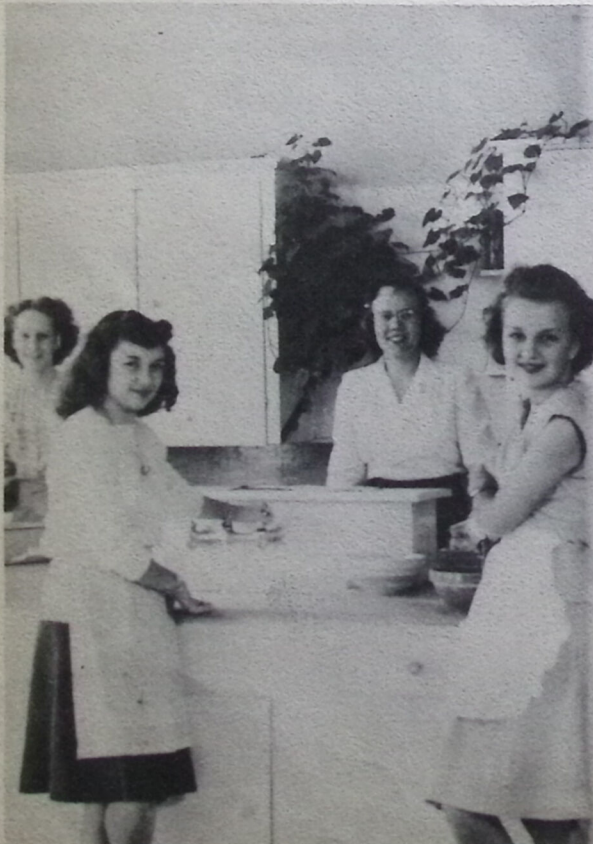

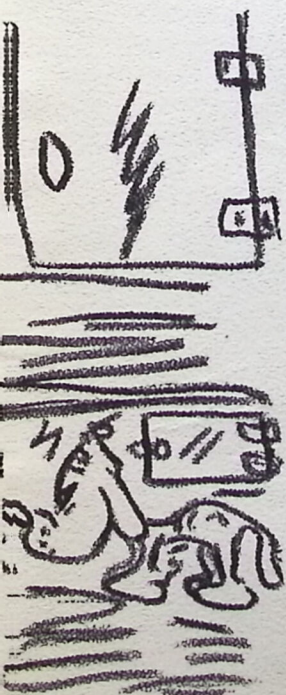

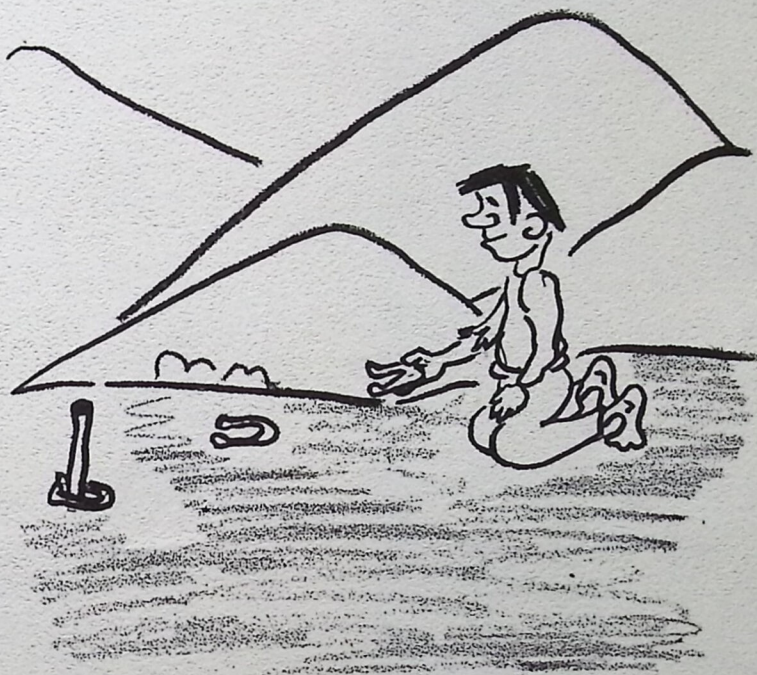

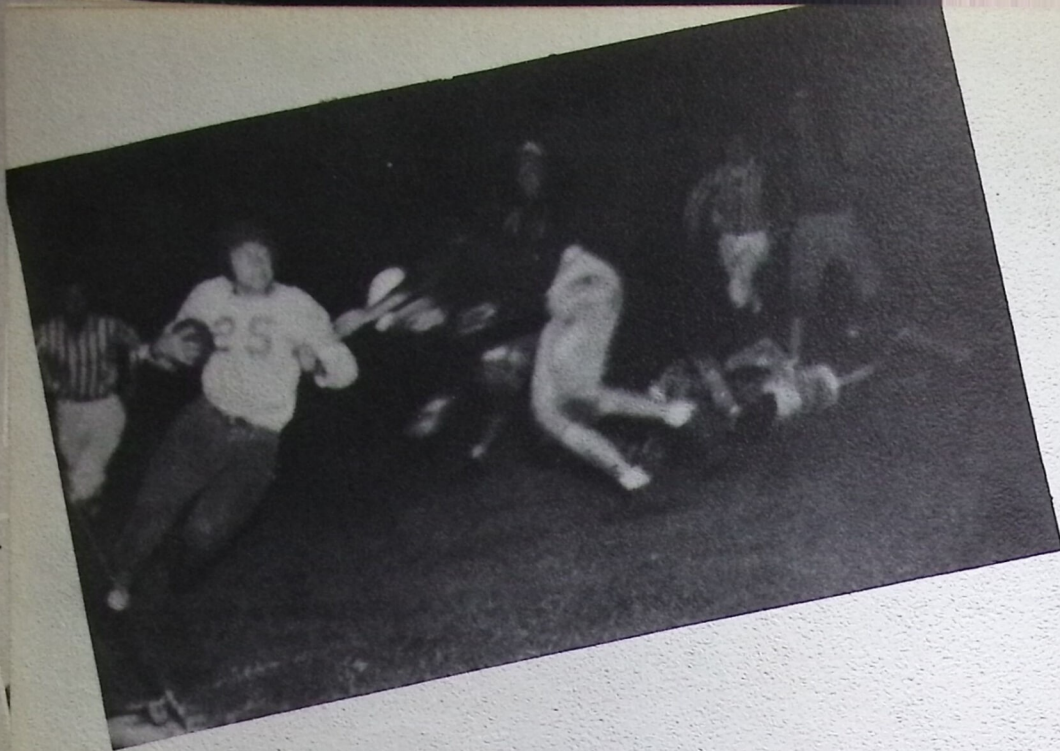

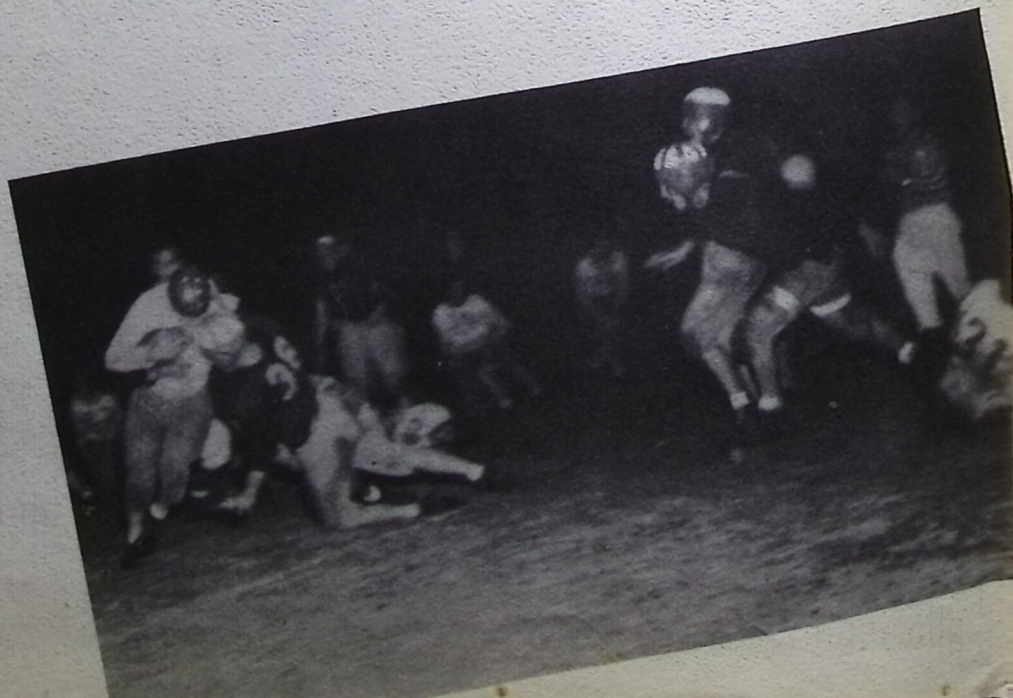


Harris tackles Franz from the side in the "royal battle" between Fredericksburg and Llano.

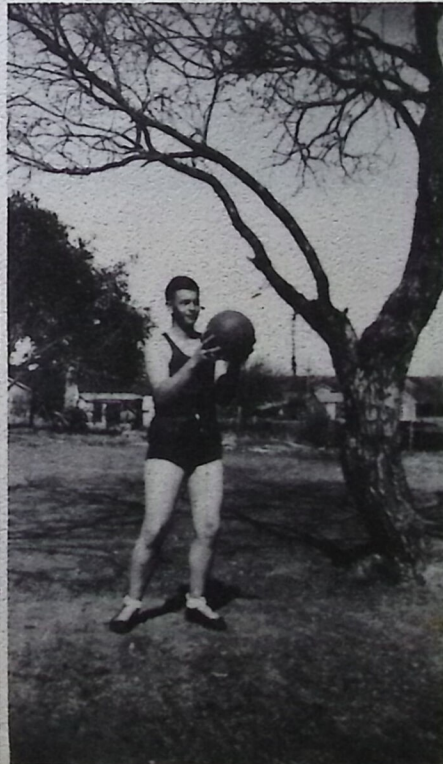

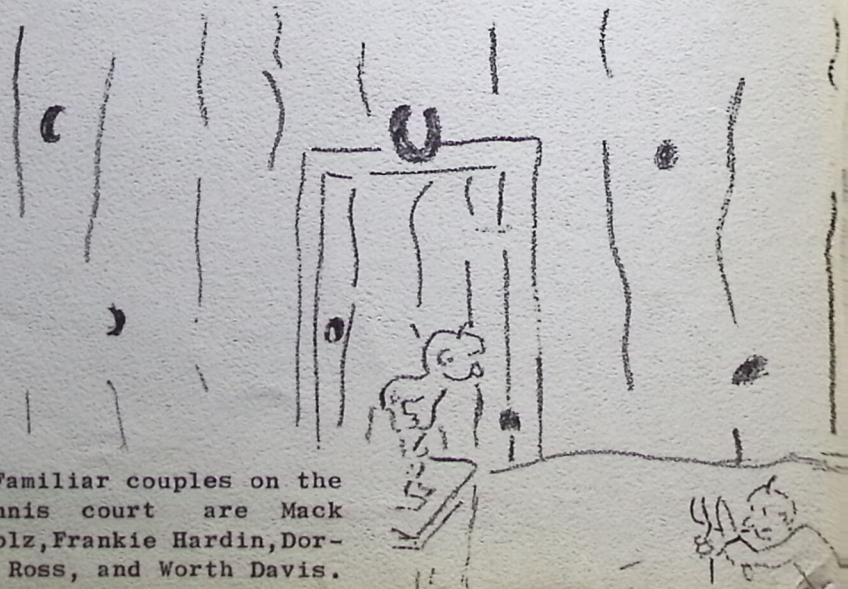

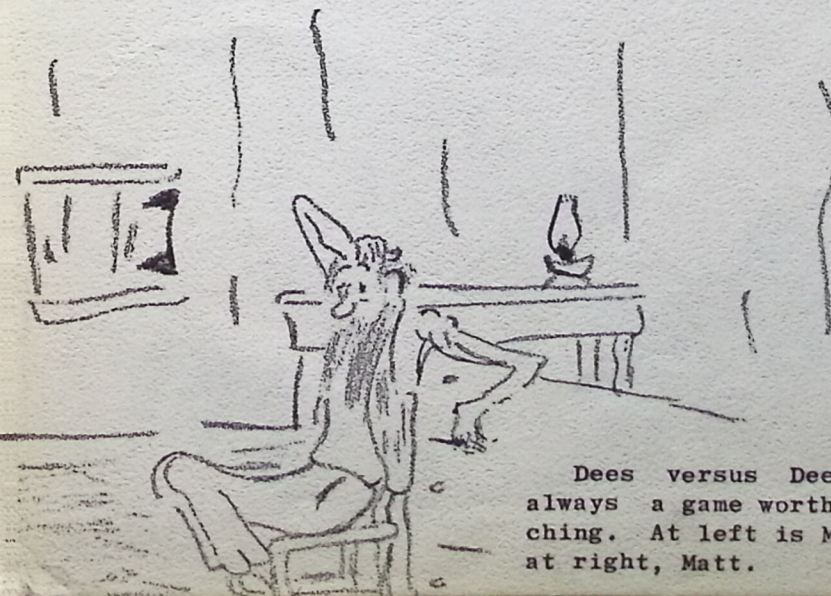
