Llano is a town with a well-rounded personality. It has a fine business district, including almost every type of business one could wish for.

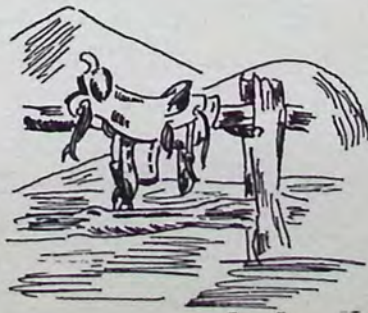
The rambling court house located in the center of town represents Llano's system of government.

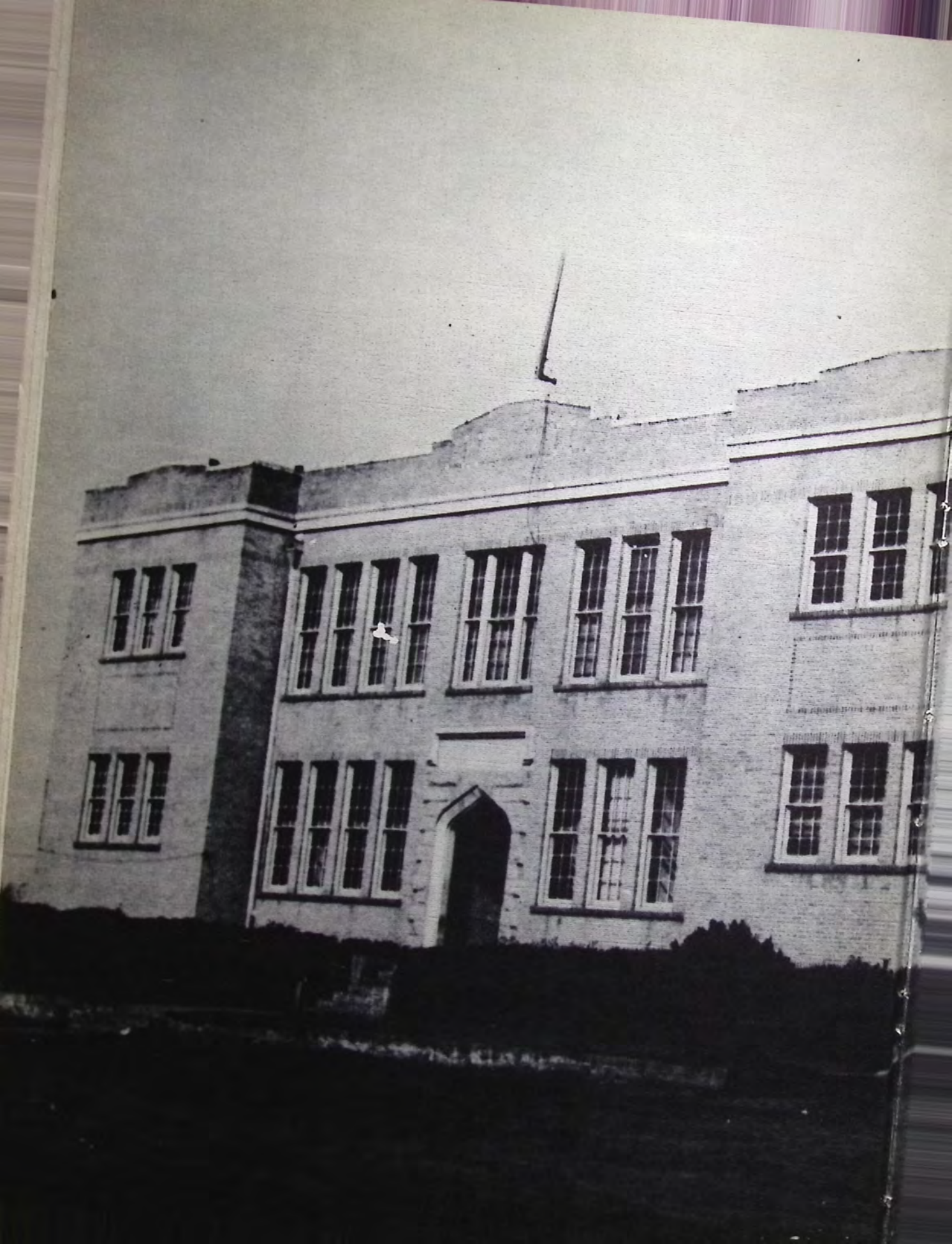
The churches are not large and magnificent, but they are neat and attractive. They house many different creeds, but all are united in their belief in God.

The Llano people follow many trades, but whatever they are, they are glad to pass their knowledge on to the younger generation.

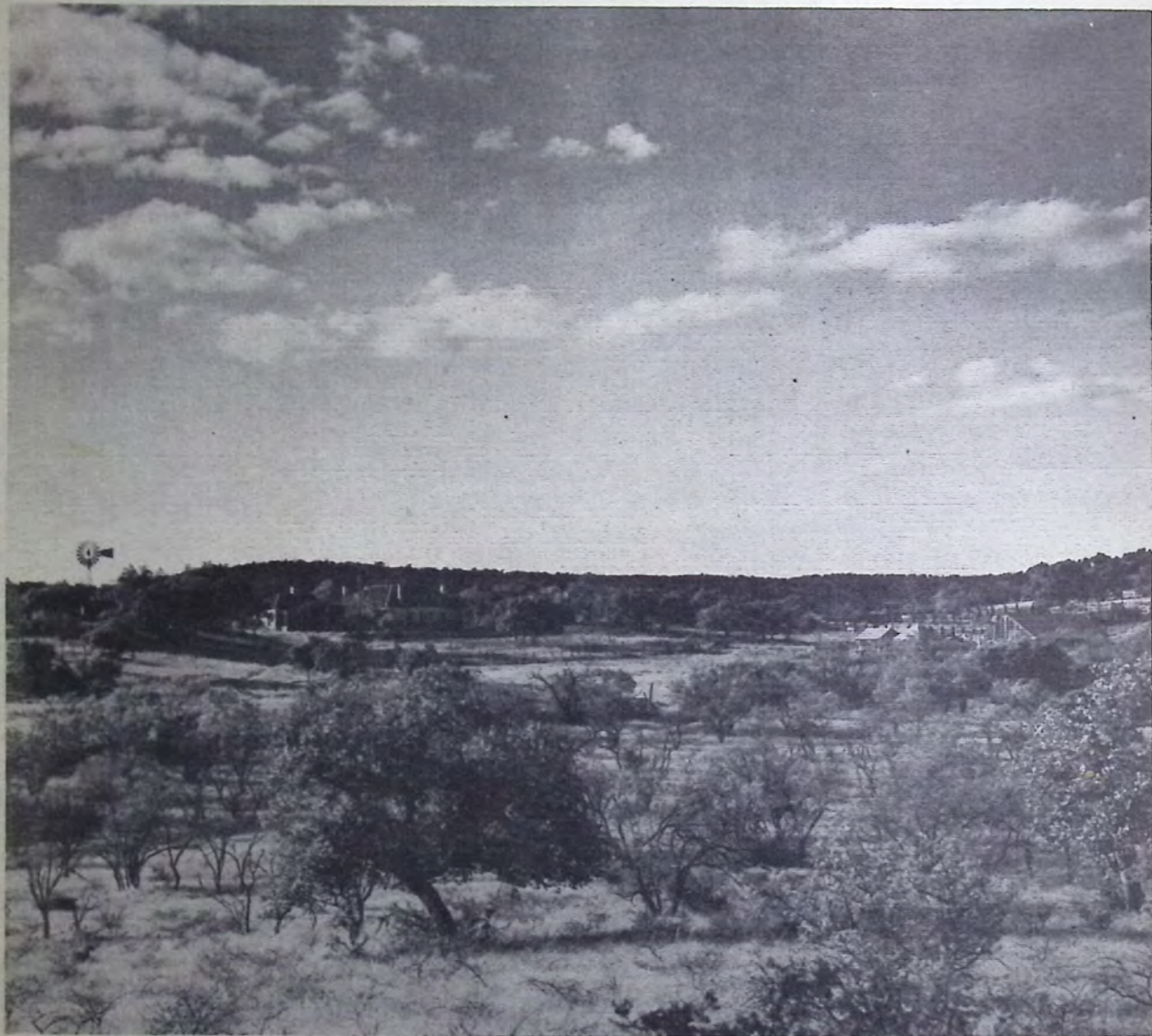

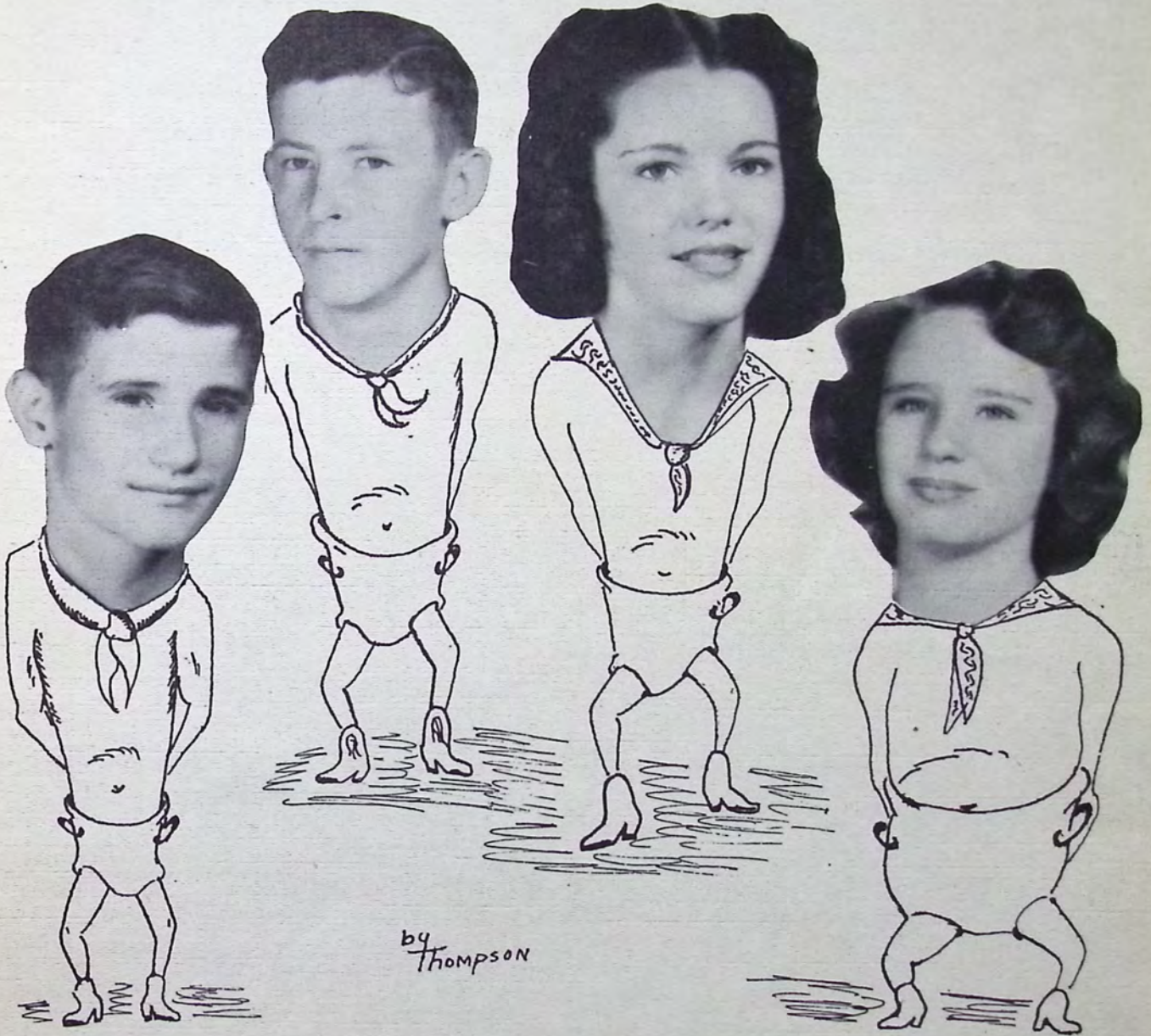
OUR CIVIC LIFE

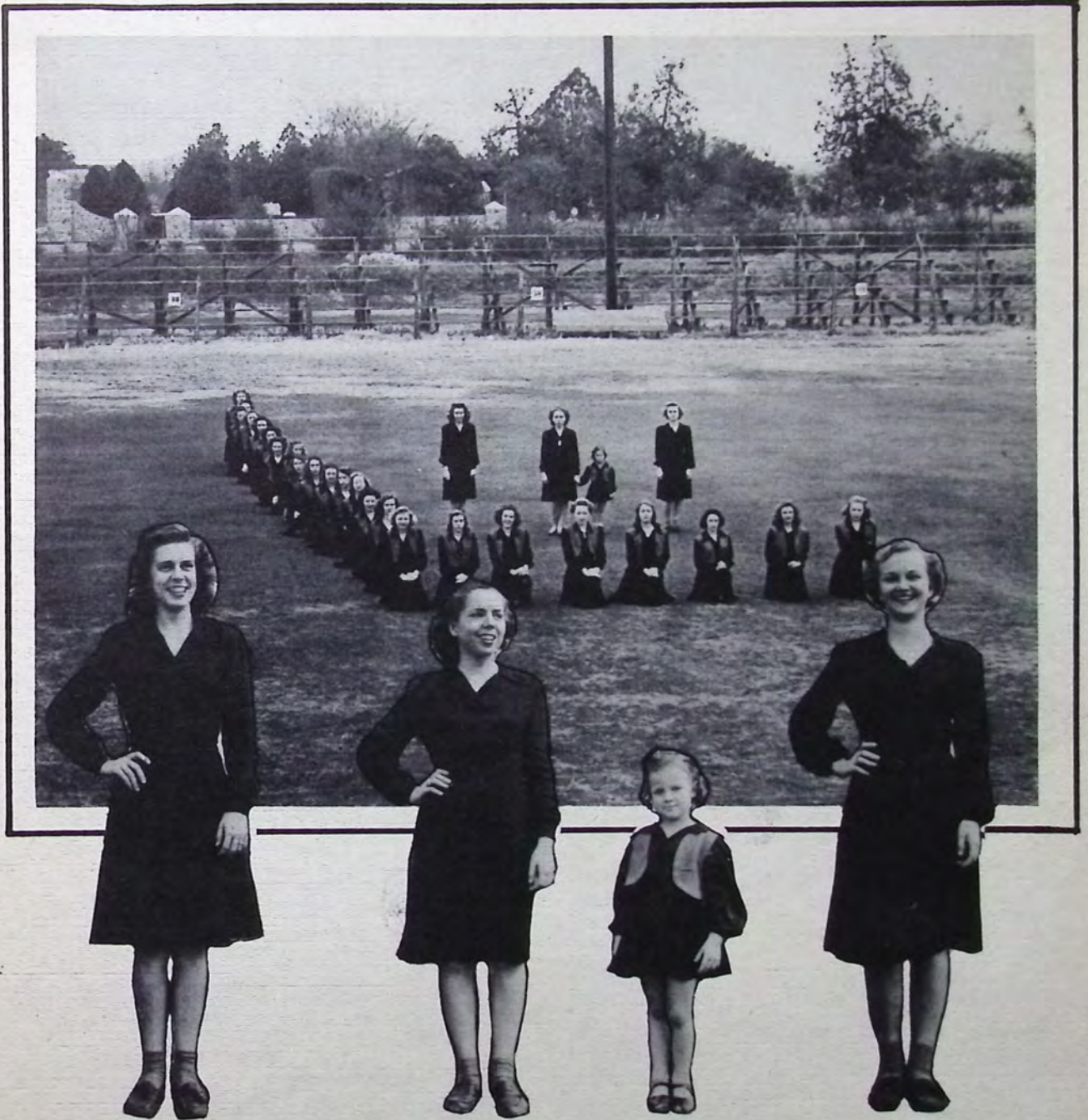
Margaret Williams, shortest of the three leaders, does not allow her size to affect her voice. Margaret has been in the Pep Squad ever since she has been in high school.

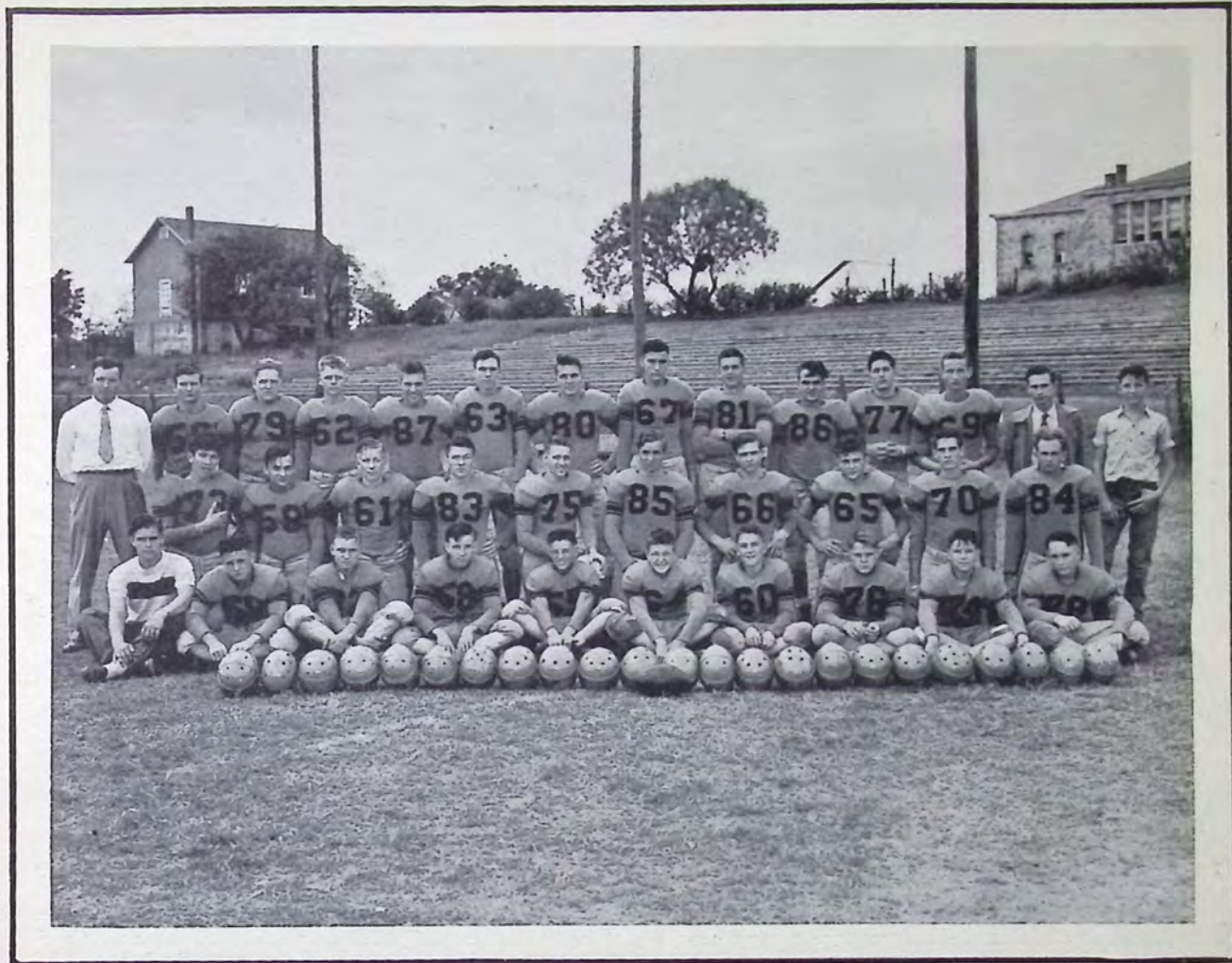

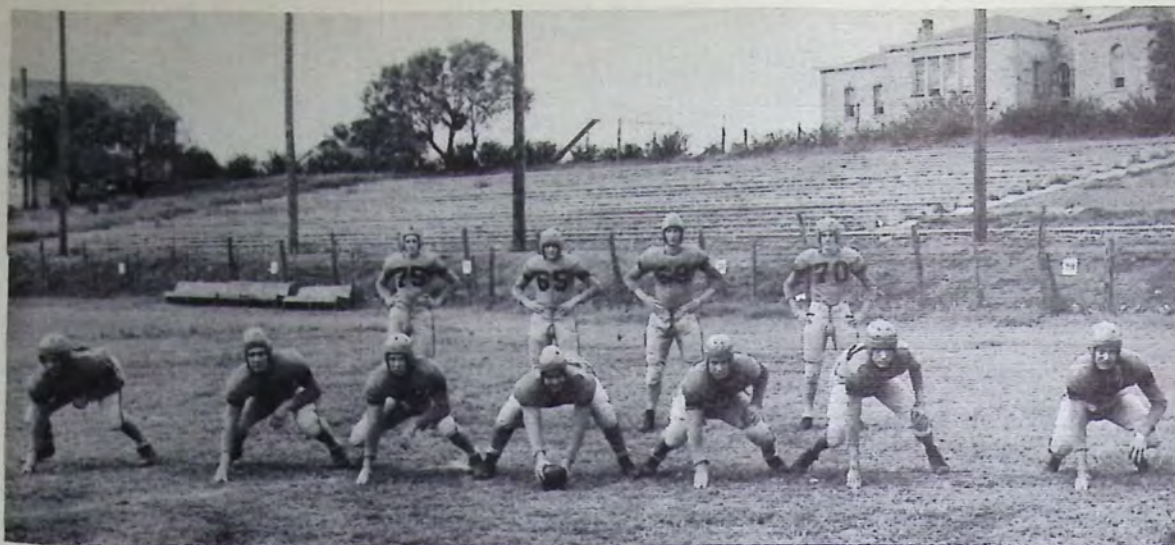

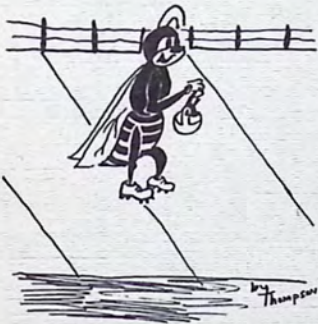
To the left is P. H. Barnhart. He has been Coach at Llano High School for five years. Coach is a big favorite with all students, particularly the football boys.

To the right is W. L. Howard who volunteered to act as Coach Barnhart's assistant. This is Mr. Howard's first year here, but he is already well liked by students.



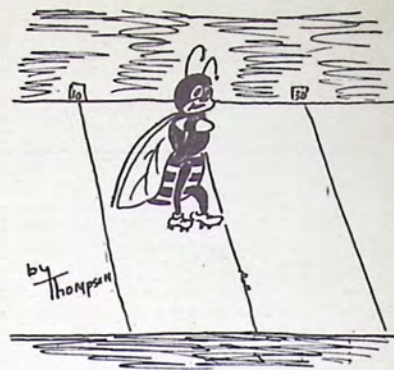

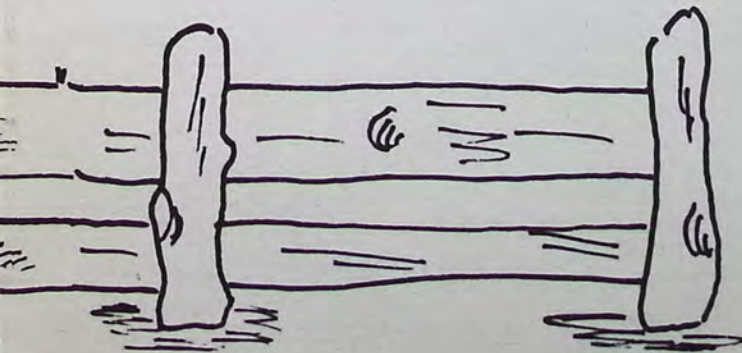
Later in the year the three clubs merged into the Llano Chapter of the FHA (Future Homemakers of America). Officers elected for this club were:

- Reporter..... Betty Jo Overstreet

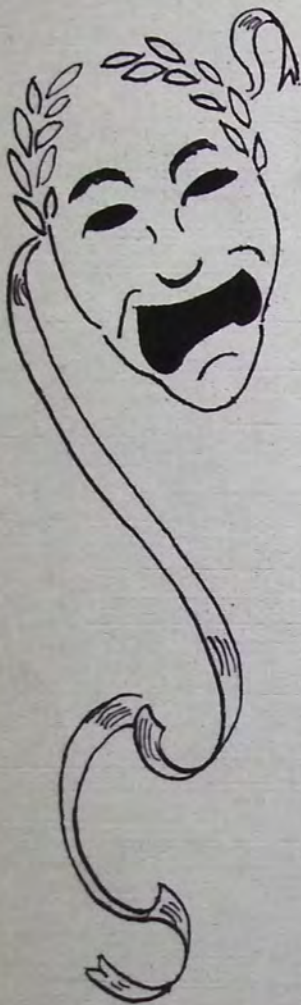

BLUE CURTAIN DRAMA CLUB

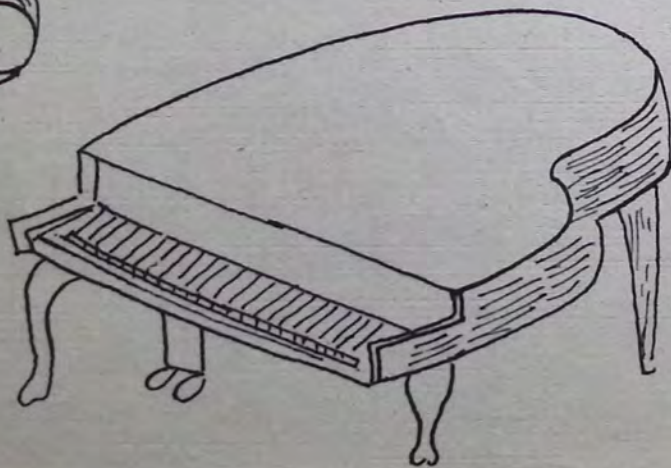
