

JOHN HALLFORD CLICK

Another sad death occurred in our county, when J. H. Click died very suddenly at his ranch Tuesday afternoon from heart failure. Mr. Click was 51 years of age at the time of his death. He was born in Hays County and came to this county in 1885 and in 1888 was married to Miss Sussie Brooks. To this couple were born 12 children, Mrs. J. S. Waldrop, Alfred Click of Arizona, Mrs. C. V. Mrs. Susan Click died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Ruth Baskin, in Phoenix, Arizona, Monday of this week.

see you, but think I will go when school is out.
Uncle John Colford is dead & Mr Laughlin
family has moved to the Ordinalis. I liked to
have forgotten to tell you Sydney Alexander is
married his wife lived in Bastrop Co. Kate
Beauchamp has a little girl, you must bring
some back or there will be so many new
comes you will be a stranger. I hope you will
get home by the time peaches get ripe, if nothing
happens we will have plenty of them. I havnt
heard from your uncle Jim Reeser for some
time. But your cousin John ^{3rd child of 1855 and 1857} was married to ^{+ Elizabeth Clark}
a Miss Bird. Miss Mollie sends her best
love to you & says she would love to see you
back here again. & often thinks of the folly
times you had when you were here. Please
be sure & write soon & let me know where you
are & I will always write when I know where to
send my letter but you must write away now
& you & John ^{Wright} come to see us soon as you can.
